

### The Early Years Curriculum

- The children will follow the Early Years Curriculum
- There are seven areas of learning and development
- There are three Prime Areas and four Specific Areas
- These lead towards 'Early Learning Goals' (ELGs) at the end of the year



#### Prime Areas

- Three areas are particularly important the 'Prime Areas'
- They are crucial because they build:
  - a foundation for igniting children's curiosity
  - enthusiasm for learning,
  - children's ability to form relationships and thrive!

### Communication and Language



- This area of learning focuses on listening, understanding and speaking.
- Children are regularly asked to share their thoughts and ideas with each other.
- There are lots of opportunities for children to explore the meaning of new words through stories and play.

### Personal, Social and Emotional Development

- Self- regulation is about understanding their own feelings as well as working towards simple goals.
- Children will learn to be confident to try new activities and show independence and perseverance in the face of challenge.
- Children will learn to manage their own hygiene and personal needs, including dressing, going to the toilet and understanding the importance of healthy food choices.
- Forming positive relationships with adults and other children.





## Physical Development

- This area of learning focuses on children's developing physical control, mobility, awareness of space and manipulative skills.
- It covers both large movements such as those used in running and jumping as well as the fine control of tools such as pens and scissors.
- The children will have one PE lesson per week whilst also having the opportunity to take part in child initiated and adult led activities in the outside classroom.





### Specific Areas

- The specific areas include essential skills and knowledge.
- They grow out of the prime areas, and provide important contexts for learning.

- This area covers all aspects of early reading and writing skills.
- Children are given opportunities for early writing on a daily basis.
- Reading and writing is taught in small groups using the 'Little Wandle Letters and Sounds' scheme.
- We read with children I: I and in guided reading sessions.

#### Mathematics



- This area covers all aspects of early mathematics including counting, number recognition, number ordering, early calculations.
- Having a deep understanding of number to 10.
- Subitising (recognise quantities without counting) up to 5.
- Automatically recalling number bonds up to 5 and some number bonds to 10, including double facts.
- We focus on practical activities that encourage the use and understanding of mathematical language and ideas.

### Understanding the World



- This area of learning focuses on developing children's understanding of their environment, other people and their cultures and features of the natural and man-made world.
- It provides a foundation for the later subjects of science, history, geography and computing.

#### Expressive Arts and Design



- This area of learning focuses on the development of children's imagination and their ability to communicate ideas and feelings in creative ways through music, art and imaginative play.
- Children will have a music lesson with our specialist music teacher each week and music will be taught in both French and English for both classes.

Core Books



- Our learning will be inspired by high quality texts. This includes a range of fiction, non-fiction and poetry.
- We aim to develop language and increase vocabulary in addition to gaining a love of books.
- Supplementary books will run alongside each core book.

### A Reception Day

8:4-Oam Doors open: The school day starts. (The door closes at 9am for safety)

**Morning session**: The children are involved in focused activities linked to literacy and maths. They also take part in a range of child-initiated activities in the inside and outside classrooms.

**Fruit time**: As part of the Schools Fruit and Vegetable Scheme children enjoy a piece of fruit or a vegetable each day.

11:4-5am Lunch: Lunch is eaten in the Olympic Hall and playtime is in Early Years.

**Afternoon session**: In the afternoon there is more of a creative emphasis on learning with a range of activities inside and outside linked to the Core Book.

3.15pm Home time: Please collect your child from the classroom door. Please be punctual.

#### Forest School



- We are also lucky to have trained Forest School staff
- We have an area of woodland on site, with trees, bushes, plants, grass, minibeasts and lots of mud!
- Forest School sessions are built into the school day
- We use Forest School to complement our provision, with a focus on building children's confidence, language, and understanding of the natural world.

#### French

As part of our enhanced French provision the children will ..

- Learn greetings such as 'Bon jour', 'Au revoir', along with commands like, 'Levez-vous', 'Ecoutez', and 'Regardez-moi'.
- Learn commands in both languages, with consistent actions to help the children to understand in either language.
- Sing songs in French.
- En joy listening to simple stories in French.
- Count in French.



### Getting Ready for Reception

- Encourage independence
- Encourage your child to `use their words and speak in full sentences
- Dressing and undressing
- Ensuring your child is fully toilet trained
- Eating independently and using a knife and fork
- Blow their own nose and catching coughs
- Recognising own name
- Label all of child's belongings



There will be more details about the following in your welcome letter which will be sent out to you electronically and will also be available on the school website:


- If your child has medical needs: please let us know in advance.
